AREA (DSCBA) is to promote the unique contributions of children, teens, and adults with Down syndrome by providing direct services to them and to their families, and to educate the public by fostering inclusive and integrated involvement with the Down syndrome community and society at large. We have been working toward this mission for more than 15 years. Significant components of this support are our guidance and resources for children entering and in the educational systems.

We realize that it is equally important to provide educational and training opportunities to the educators who spend countless hours dedicated to fostering the development of students with Down syndrome. Providing this support to educators is what the Down Syndrome Educational Alliance (DSEA) aims to do. We are committed to providing educators and professionals with up-to-date information and services regarding researchbased best practices for educating students with Down syndrome.

People with Down syndrome are not simply "globally delayed" in all areas; there is a general learning and cognitive profile with clear strengths and weaknesses regarding how students with Down syndrome perceive, process, and express information. Our goal is to share that information with as many educators as possible so that all students, particularly those with Down syndrome, can reach their fullest potential.

As one example, we know that young school-aged children with Down syndrome often have limited verbal ability. This may be due to an expressive/receptive gap, apraxia of speech, and/or low muscle tone. It is important not to simply assume the student didn't understand your request. Also, because people with Down syndrome often experience a processing delay, by simply waiting 10 seconds for a response, you can change the life of a student with Down syndrome and allow him or her to participate with peers.

When a school district joins our Educational Alliance, we train and support educator teams and administrators so that they can understand specific learning profiles, strengths, and weaknesses of students with Down syndrome. After training, each attendee receives ample pertinent information on educating students with Down syndrome. Topics addressed include behavior, communication, inclusion, curriculum adaptation, and more.

When a school district agrees to partner with the Down Syndrome Connection of the Bay Area, they have access to numerous benefits and resources.
